Trades Hold 2025 Annual Convention in Morgantown

On September 17, the West Virginia Building and Construction Trades Council (WVBCT) held their annual convention at the Waterfront Hotel and Conference Center in Morgantown, West Virginia.

More than 70 representatives from all WVBCT-affiliated craft organizations attended the event to conduct annual business, network, and hear from various speakers on industry issues.

In addition to the normal business of the convention, a special election was held for WVBCT President to fulfill the remaining 3 years on former WVBCT President Chuck Parker's term.

Parker, who also serves as Business Manager for IUOE 132, stepped down as WVBCT President earlier this year to take on an expanded role with the International Union of Operating Engineers.

After the special election, Brad Winans, Business Manager for Iron Workers 787 in Parkersburg, West Virginia, was elected to the position of WVBCT President.

"I truly appreciate all of our folks who put their faith in me," said Winans. "I'm proud of what we have accomplished over the past few years, and I look forward to continuing

that work and representing all of our members."

WVBCT Wins National Construction Award for STAND Associate Degree Program

Earlier this month, the West Virginia Building and Construction Trades were awarded the Workforce Development Award from the Construction User's Roundtable (CURT) for their work on the Skilled Trades Apprenticeship Nontraditional De-

gree Program (STAND).

The STAND program allows West Virginia residents who have completed a Department of Labor (DOL) registered apprenticeship program (or West Virginia residents who are currently enrolled in a DOL appren-

ticeship program) to complete an Associate of Applied Science degree at a West Virginia public community and technical college by taking only the general education courses that are needed—all covered at no cost to the student apprentice.

The CURT Workforce Development Award is given annually to celebrate extraordinary or innovative training and educational programs.

The award is meant to recognize those individuals and construction

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Trades, Hope Gas, and WVU Partnering to Refurbish Landmark Evansdale Water Tower

Work to clean the tank surface will begin soon followed by painting and sealing to protect against the weather elements while keeping in place the well-known “Flying WV” logo at the top. The tank was last painted in 2007.

Tower additions will include the installation of LED lighting around the University’s logo to allow for illumination for all to see for miles during sporting events, special University

events, and other occasions.

“There are so many things to celebrate in Morgantown and across West Virginia,” Morgan O’Brien, Hope Gas president and CEO, said. “Hope Gas is proud to support Presi-

dent Benson’s vision of refurbishing an already recognizable fixture in Morgantown to visually celebrate the big wins of Mountaineers.”

A water tower has been part of the landscape for the Evansdale area of campus since the 1960s.

At one point, the 80,000 gallon storage tank served as a “surge tank” for fire suppression systems and drinking water.

“The work of our highly skilled trades men and women will be show-

cased as we help turn the WVU Water Tower into an asset that will celebrate University successes for many years to come,” said Justin Williams, director of the West Virginia Building and Construction Trades.

“This project highlights the real value partnerships among industry, labor and education can bring to communities across the Mountain State.”

The projected timeline for the completion of the upgrade work on the WVU water tower is weather dependent. ■

IUOE Local #132 Accepting Applications December 1 - December 31, 2025

Operating Engineers Local 132 wants qualified candidates for their heavy-duty equipment operator apprenticeship program in Medina, WV.

The three-year program trains in all aspects of operating heavy equipment including bulldozers, backhoes, cranes and excavators.

Applications will begin to be accepted starting December 1 and will continue to be accepted through December 31, 2025.

"We want members to be well versed in all types of equipment," said Brian Board, Training Director for IUOE 132. "We focus on safety and productivity."

Each year an apprentice spends

five weeks at the training center located south of Parkersburg in Medina, West Virginia.

While most of the training takes place during the winter, apprentices must complete at least 1,000 hours of paid on-the-job training to advance each year.

Interested individuals can submit an application to the program online at www.iuoe132.org or by calling 304-273-4852 from December 2, 2024 through January 3, 2025.

In order to qualify, a person must be at least 18 years old, have a high school diploma or equivalent and have been a resident of West Virginia for at least one year.

A successful applicant will have a

valid WV driver's license, be physically able to perform the work of the trade and pass a drug test.

The recruitment, selection, employment, and training of apprentices shall be without discrimination

because of age, race, color, religion, national origin, or sex and will conform to ADA regulations.

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related entities that have gone above and beyond to create a program that benefits the larger construction industry.

"We are very proud of the work our members and partners have completed to make the STAND Program possible," said George Capel, Government Relations Director for the West Virginia Building and Construction Trades Council.

"I truly believe this program is going to help strengthen the pipeline of skilled leaders to the construction industry."

During the 2025 West Virginia Legislative Session, new funds were made available to cover tuition costs for associate degrees at WV community and technical colleges for members of the trades.

HB 2026, also known as the Budget Bill, included a \$1,033,650 budgetary appropriation to the West Virginia Council for Community and Technical College Education, which covers associate degree tuition costs for individuals who are currently enrolled in or have completed a Department of Labor-registered apprentice-

ship program.

West Virginia resident DOL apprenticeship completers who enroll in the program have six years from the date of enrolling to complete their associate degree of applied sciences.

The list of colleges where the STAND funding can cover the tuition for trades members include: West Virginia University at Parkersburg, Mountwest CTC, West Virginia Northern CTC, New River CTC, Pierpont CTC, Blue Ridge CTC, Southern West Virginia CTC, Eastern West Virginia CTC, and BridgeValley CTC.

Representatives from the trades are set to attend the CURT Awards Ceremony in Florida next month to formally accept the Workforce Development Award for the STAND program.
